Hints and tips

You've chosen a pawfect way to raise funds for Hearing Dogs for Deaf People – thank you. Quizzes are simple to organise and lots of fun. Using our Quiz Pack, you won't need to spend time thinking up questions and researching answers. Instead you can concentrate on making the event an outstanding success for yourself, your quizzers and the Charity.

Here are some hints and tips to help your organise your quiz:

Venue

Pubs can be a great place for quizzes, with a ready supply of food, drinks, tables, chairs and a warm friendly atmosphere! They may welcome the extra trade and might even offer a special deal for a buffet or meals which you can include as part of the ticket price for entering the quiz. Your local community hall might be another good place to hold a quiz.



Check the maximum number of people your venue will allow, then you can work out how many teams can take part and whether the venue is viable for your event.

If you're planning to include other fundraising activities on the night – a raffle for example – then ensure there is enough room for spare tables on which to display the raffle items.

Date and time

Choose a date that suits your audience – week nights work well for business people, but if you're looking to attract families a weekend evening might work better.

Aim to conclude your quiz within 3 hours, by 10.30pm at the latest. Any later than that might put people off, especially during the week.

Entry Charge

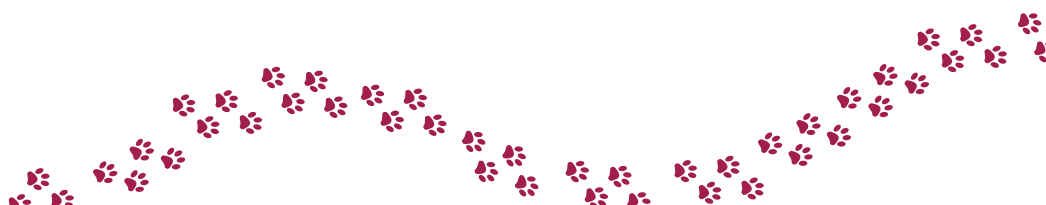
It's fairer to make a charge per person. £5 is a good starting point, but you might consider increasing that if you have really decent prizes. Also, if food is included, remember to add that into the entry cost.



Teams

Decide on team size. Most quizzes allow 4-6 people per team. If someone doesn't have enough people to make up a team, consider helping them team up with other quizzers to maximise your numbers. Ensure you mention this when promoting the quiz.

On the night, ask the teams to come up with a name at the beginning. You can encourage a competitive spirit by setting up a score board, putting up team names and entering their scores after each round.



Marking

You can mark the quizzes yourself, get a volunteer to mark them, or get the teams to mark each other's papers when the answers are read out. It's often considered fairer for the papers to be marked by a designated person.

If you do ask teams to mark their own papers, then consider whether you should collect in all the answer sheets between rounds or get teams to call out their scores. The first option is the fairer one.

Themes?

If the date of your quiz coincides with any special occasion coming up, eg. Christmas or Halloween, you might want to theme your night to suit. The Quiz Pack includes two rounds of festive Christmas questions.



Team prizes

These are a great way to encourage people to participate. Local business owners, your venue, supermarkets, even friends and colleagues might be persuaded to donate prizes. If all else fails, you could budget to use a small amount of what you raise to offer monetary prizes.

Spread the word

After you have your venue, date and time set, start telling everyone you know that the quiz is happening. Fill out our poster template and encourage people to put up posters at work, the venue and on local noticeboards (permissions may be required). Use social media and your local press too.

Making your event inclusive for people with hearing loss

A good MC or quizmaster is an essential part of a successful quiz night. However, if any of your quizzers suffer with hearing loss (one in six of the population do) they may not be able to hear the questions. So you might want to consider putting your quiz on Powerpoint too, so that you can show the questions on screen at the same time as they are read out. This will ensure everyone can join in.

Other fun ways to fundraise on the night

Heads or tails?

This is good fun and interactive, giving everyone the chance to participate, and should take no more than 10 minutes. Ask quizzers to put £1 in a pot. Your MC or quizmaster then asks everyone participating to stand up, and to choose heads or tails by putting their hands on their head or their backside. Then, flip a coin. Those who chose correctly remain standing, the rest sit down. Continue until you have just one person standing, who is the winner and receives a prize.

Raffle

Offer quizzers the opportunity to buy raffle tickets from the beginning of the evening and/or send someone round to the tables to sell tickets. The raffle could be drawn at the mid-quiz break to save time at the finish. This will also enable you to count the raffle monies before the end of the evening so you can declare a grand total of what's been raised before everyone leaves.



Mulligans

A 'Mulligan' allows a team to submit two answers for a single question in the hope that one of their answers is correct. It can be used once per team per round. You could offer teams the chance to buy 'Mulligans' at the beginning of the evening before the quiz starts. To identify when 'Mulligans' are in play you can provide stickers which teams then stick beside their answers, or give each team a coloured pen so they can add a capital M to that answer.

Team Jokers

A 'Joker' allows teams to earn double points and can be played against one round during the quiz. If you decide that teams can play a 'Joker', make sure the titles of each round are read out or listed at the beginning of the evening, teams can then make their choice when to play it. The quizmaster or MC can then ask teams at the start of each round whether any will be playing their 'Joker'. A 'Joker' can be in the form of a card that you issue to each team (the team name is recorded on it and collected in with the answer sheets, or noted on the score board), or it can be as simple as a large 'J' being added to the answer sheet for that round.

Beer, gin or wine tasting!

If you've chosen a pub as your venue, this could be easy to organize with the landlord and a fun thing to do between quiz rounds.

Hearing Dogs collection box

Ensure you place a collection box somewhere in the venue – near the quizmaster or raffle is good – so quizzers can donate any loose change.

Remember:

- Charge more for your entry tickets if you are providing food or drink.
- Print off enough blank answer sheets for your teams. You will need one per round per team.
- Ensure you have the team prizes and heads or tails prize ready.
- Brief your MC/quizmaster to ensure quizzers know the quiz rules, for example:
 - no calling out answers
 - switching off mobile phones!
 - points system adopted
 - how papers will be marked
 - rules of 'Mulligans' and/or 'Team Jokers' if using
 - use the tie-breaker questions in the event of a tie
- Gift Aid – cannot be claimed on quiz entry fees because they are not considered to be donations. However, donations that are not entry fees where the supporter gets nothing in return are eligible for Gift Aid providing the donor is UK tax payer. In this case, ask them to complete a Gift Aid form which your community fundraising manager can supply.

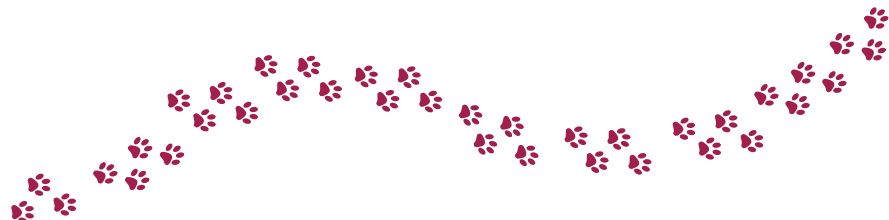

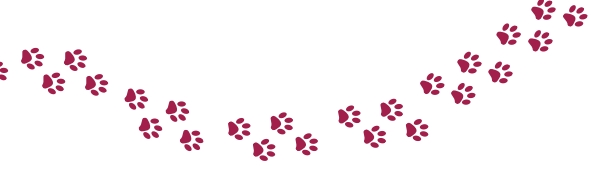
